Principal's Message



Thank you for taking the time to read our newsletter. Along with Connect, the <u>Ardross Primary School webpage</u> and Facebook, we aim to keep you informed on what happens on a day to day basis.

Students will be getting their hands dirty over the next three weeks, as Ardross PS students undertake our annual buddy planting around the school. Under the supervision of our Sustainability Coordinator, Bruce Ivers, and our gardener, Scott, students will be working to a journey of rejuvenation in our beautiful native garden at the front of the school.

We will also be continuing our school's commitment to environmental citizenship as our older students work with local councils and community groups on revegetation and environmental restoration. Our Year 3s will once again be working with the City of Melville at Deepwater Point, our Year 5s with the Bicton Environmental Action Group at Point Walter, and our Year 6s with the Shire of Harvey at Myalup Beach. Year 4s will again be travelling out to York in early Term 3. These projects are an important part of the Ardross PS educational experience, and of our River Rangers program.

Even the staff are getting down in the mud at Point Walter. As part of this week's Staff Development Day, our staff will be engaging in a Two Knowledges experience with Mandy Bamford (Ecologist) and David Collard (Noongar Educator) learning more about the connections

between traditional knowledge and modern science. They will also be participating in revegetation planting in partnership with the Bicton Environmental Action Group.

Altogether, our school has over 8000 seedlings which we will be planting in support of these initiatives, and has committed over \$19,000 of school and Cadets WA funding to ensure our students are able to continue to engage in these valued and educational experiences.

Sustainability Update

The Sustainability Committee has been working hard to ensure the effective use of the funds from the Voluntary Sustainability Initiatives Contribution targeting the school's waste management and lighting replacement plan. After the unfortunate discontinuation of the Green Batch recycling program, our school has brought Suez on board to meet our recycling needs, to ensure our recyclable hard plastics, cans, glass and paper avoids landfill.

As you are hopefully aware our school community continues to collect bread bags and tags for the 'Wonder Recycling Rewards', and 'Containers for Change'. Please keep bringing these in to fight waste and contribute to the school.

The Committee is happy to announce that we have formulated a lighting replacement and upgrade plan to exchange outdated light globes around the school for cost effective, environmentally friendly LED bulbs. We have completed a lighting and energy usage audit and aim to replace the external security floodlights first, followed by the rest of the exterior lights and finally the internal lights. By switching to LEDs we can reduce the school power bill, as well as provide savings in maintenance costs. Recent research also shows that LED lights provide health and safety benefits and achieve better lighting levels which can lead to an improved learning environment for our kids. Win win!

HELPING CHILDREN MAKE FRIENDS

Not all children find making friends easy. There is a variety of reasons that some struggle to begin with: having a good friend leave the school, being in a different class to likely friends, having different interests, being more introverted or shy that other classmates or simply 'chance'.

In primary school, most friendships start by playing together, so when you're helping them to make new friends, 'play' - in particular, lunchtime - is often the first context to address.

Here are a few ideas that can help them start the process:

- Breaking down lunch and recess to the basics 'Who can you sit with? Where do they
 play? Are you finishing your lunch quickly enough so that you can stay with the others
 when they leave to play?' Correcting these little transitions from class to eating to
 playing to lining up can increase the amount of lunchtime contact with potential
 friends.
- Cementing in good play behaviours try (to the best of your ability!) to understand how the game works and reinforce good etiquette and behaviour. Remember, some children 'play to win' and others 'play to play', but it's always important to make them aware of how others are perceiving their behaviour. Taking turns being 'it', letting everyone have a turn, and compromising over disputes are a few good pointers when they're learning the ropes of a new game.
- Verbalising and practicing social skills workshop with them how to go about introducing themselves, start conversations, remembering others' interests and good topics, asking to join in and keeping the conversation going after the game.
- Encouraging continuity if they had a great lunchtime with some new friends, make sure they follow-up on subsequent days, as this helps them establish their part in the group.
- Helping them limit 'attempts' if they have tried a number of times to initiate play with a
 particular child, and it's not working, it may be time to help them move on and try

someone else. You can encourage them for trying and explain that the other person might not be ready for the friendship yet and then identify other classmates they may want to start to play with.
